### Windshield Wipers

When it's winter, your wipers get a workout. Between the flurries, the hard snows, the slush that gets kicked up and that film of filth that seems to cake your window to the road ahead, your windshield wipers are essential to make it through the season. Make sure your wipers are in working order, free from cracks and rips along the wiper blade. If they're leaving streaks on your windshield, that's a good sign they may be worn out. Replacing them would be a good idea since

#### **Check Your Fluids**

Fluids are vital to keep your vehicle running in peak condition no matter the season. Checking those fluids can help ensure your vehicle is ready for freezing temps. Your coolant, oil and transmission fluid may need to be topped off or changed - this is where a local auto mechanic can help if you're not familiar with the process. You should also check your windshield wiper fluid since those wipers are going to be busy. Some wiper fluids are rated to still work when the temps dip well below freezing.

# **Check Your Tires**

Some drivers used a dedicated set of winter tires. But if you're like a lot of people, you stick with one set of all season tires year round. No matter what tires you use during the winter season, it's important to give them a preseason check.

Worn and bald tires can be disastrous when the roads get slick. That's why it's important to check the tread on your current tires before winter crud starts to cake the roads. Some people do the penny test to check the tread on their tires. This is a basic way to check the tread without fancy tools. Grab a penny, place in the tread groove with Lincoln's head going in first. If you can see the top of Abe's head, your tread may be too shallow and your tires may need replacing. #### **Test Your Tire Pressure**

In addition to making sure the tread on your tires are winter ready, you're also going to want to keep an eye on your tire pressure. If the pressure becomes too low, your will wear uneven and it could lead to a flat. Temperature swings that happen throughout winter can cause deflation in your tires. Properly inflated tires ensure proper grip. So check the pressure in your tires often and fill as needed.



## **Battery, Belts and Hoses**

Your battery needs more juice to start your vehicle when it's cold out. As your battery gets older, it's not as effective in getting your car started. So if you have an older battery, you may want to have it tested so see if it needs replacing. Also under your hood, belts and hoses should be checked too. Cracks and tears can happen over time.
