FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

First Reading: Acts 4:8-12

Peter explains to the elders that his healing of a cripple was done in the name of Jesus Christ. He reminds he elders that they crucified Jesus, but God rose him up so that all people could be saved in his name.

Second Reading: 1 John 3:1-2

John expresses amazement at the fact that God allowed us to be called his children. Although we are unsure exactly what we will be after this life, we do know that we will see God as he is and be like him.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

Jesus speaks of a shepherd working only for pay, with no real concern for the sheep being well cared for. But Jesus is our shepherd and would lay down his own life for all those in his flock. God loves him for his willingness to sacrifice himself for the sake of all God's children.

SACRIFICIAL LOVE

The readings of the day demonstrate that Jesus Christ cares for us as a Shephard, not as a simple shepherd, but as a good shepherd

who cares for his flock at the cost of his life. Jesus explains that he is the good Shephard who knows his sheep and will do anything to save them. This image reminds us that Jesus is intimately involved in our lives and that he knows us and loves us individually.

The good Shephard makes sacrifices for the sheep not because it's required but because it's a deliberate choice. Out of love ,Jesus sacrificed his life for every one of us. His sacrificial love calls us to make a choice to love like Jesus. This reminds us of the dynamics of a healthy family life where parents choose to make sacrifices for their children out of love, not an Obligation. As loving parents, we can become good models and invite our children to choose to make a sacrifice for other family members and other people, acting out of love rather than obligation. Therefore, my dear friends, when we are presented with an opportunity to make an act of sacrificial love, let us not miss it. If we can't bring ourselves to make a sacrifice out of our weakness, we must know that He still loves us with all his heart. Let us pray to our good Shephard to help us face the consequences of outwardly love.

May our loving Jesus, the Good Shephard, help us understand the nature of sacrificial love and meaning of laying down one's own life for others. AMEN. Have a blessed, Good Shephard Sunday.

Fourth Sunday of Easter

First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 4:8-12 Peter announces an act of healing in the name of Jesus Christ.

Second Reading

1 John 3:1-2 God revealed his love for us by calling us children of God.

Gospel Reading John 10:11-18 Jesus says that he is the good shepherd who

The fourth Sunday of Easter is also called Good Shepherd Sunday. In each of the three lectionary cycles, our Gospel is taken from the 10th chapter of the Gospel of John. In Cycle B, we hear the middle verses of this chapter. Unless we consider this chapter in the greater context of John's Gospel, we will miss the radical nature of the statement Jesus makes when he declares himself to be the Good Shepherd.

This chapter of John's Gospel follows Jesus' healing of the man born blind and the rejection of this miracle by the Jewish leaders who question Jesus' authority to heal. Jesus responds to this challenge by calling himself the Good Shepherd. He is criticizing the leadership of the Pharisees and the other Jewish leaders. The Pharisees and other Jewish leaders are so angry that they attempt to stone and arrest Jesus (see John 10:31,39). This controversy with the religious leaders continues until Jesus' death.

In the portion of the chapter that we hear proclaimed today, Jesus describes his relationship with his followers as similar to the relationship between a good shepherd and his sheep. As a good shepherd will risk and lay down his life in order to protect his sheep, Jesus willingly sacrifices himself for the sake of his sheep. Jesus contrasts the actions of the good shepherd with the actions of the hired shepherd who abandons the sheep in the face of danger. In the verses following Jesus' teaching, we learn that the Pharisees and the other religious leaders understand that Jesus is referring to them when he describes the hired shepherds.

The concern of a good shepherd for his sheep is part of the shepherd's job. Jesus says, however, that the actions of the good shepherd are based upon the relationship that develops between the shepherd and the sheep. This is at the heart of the difference between the good shepherd and the hired shepherd. The good shepherd knows the sheep and therefore acts out of love. For the Good Shepherd, this is never simply part of a job; this love-in-action is integral to his identity.

As with so much of John's Gospel, one hears in this passage John's particular focus on Christology. As the sheep are known by the Good Shepherd, the Father knows Jesus and Jesus knows the Father. There is an essential unity between the Father and the Son. The freedom with which Jesus acts when he lays down his life is rooted in the unity that he shares with his Father.

In this context, Jesus also refers to others with whom he shares a relationship. By this reference, John probably understands the eventual inclusion of the Gentiles in the Christian community. Our modern ears hear this as a reference to Christian unity. The work of ecumenism is to restore unity among all Christians so that we form one flock under one shepherd, as God desires. by Loyola Press

"I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep... I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father and I will lay down my life for the sheep... This is why the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again."

As He speaks of knowing the Father, He also knows us and our needs as part of the flock. May we come to know the shepherd, appreciate His role, and follow Him as we walk our journey. He left ninety-nine in search of the one, and I may be that one.
