TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 53:10-11

Isaiah speaks of how the Servant of God will have to give his life up for the sins of other people. Because of this suffering the Servant will receive eternal life for himself and all the people whose sins are forgiven because of him.

Second Reading: Hebrews 4:14-16

Jesus is considered to be the new high priest and mediator between God and his people. Fortunately, Jesus has experienced the same temptations as other people, and so he has more tolerance of our weaknesses.

Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

Two of the disciples ask Jesus that they be allowed to sit at his right and left side when he comes into his glory. Jesus explains that they should not be concerned with their position. Instead they should concern themselves with serving others just as Jesus was planning to serve many in giving his own life for their sins.

Father Rawel's Corner EMBRACING SERVANT LEADERSHIP

In every heart, there lies a desire to be significant within society, often driving us to pursue ambitions by any means necessary. On

this World Mission Sunday, the Gospel reveals a similar longing in the sons of Zebedee. They struggle to differentiate between the Kingdom of God that Jesus speaks of and earthly Kingdom they know. It's crucial to recognize that this conversation about seeking positions of honor occurs just after Jesus predicts his passion, death and resurrection for the third time.

Jesus offers his disciples a path that is often unappreciated by the world- the path to his Kingdom is through service and self- giving, to the extent of complete sacrifice. To share in the master's glory, a disciple must also share in his sufferings. Jesus doesn't oppose greatness, rather, he opposes the worldly means of attaining it. He teaches the right way to true greatness. As a servant leader, Jesus knows and loves his followers deeply. The values he promotes are truth, honesty, authenticity, and justice. To follow Christ, one must embody these qualities. A disciple is called to walk in the footsteps of servant leadership. Indeed every baptized Christian is invited to embrace the servant leadership exemplified by Jesus. A life of simplicity and humility, not seeking power and prestige, but doing everything for the greater glory of God.

May God grant us, a mind and heart to know you and a pure Spirit that always thirsts for you. Help us to be like you- a servant leader who humbled himself to greatness.

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B Sunday, October 20, 2024

First Reading

Isaiah 53:10-11

Through his suffering, the servant of Yahweh will justify many.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 33:4-5,18-19,20,22

A prayer of praise for God's mercy

Second Reading

Hebrews 4:14-16 Jesus is the high priest who sympathizes with our weakness.

Gospel Reading

Mark 10:35-45 (shorter form Mark 10:42-45)
Jesus teaches that those who wish to be great must be the servant of all.

Background on the Gospel Reading

In this Sunday's Gospel, we continue to read from the section of Mark's Gospel that reports Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Last Sunday we heard Jesus lament the particular challenges those with many possessions face in order to enter the Kingdom of God. Jesus then predicts his passion to the Twelve, who are amazed and afraid. In this part of Mark's Gospel, Jesus' words to his closest disciples seem to be intended to prepare them for the events that will occur in Jerusalem.

In today's Gospel, James and John ask to be given seats of honor when Jesus enters into his glory. Once again, the disciples seem to be selective in what they hear Jesus say. They want to share Jesus' glory, but do not appear to understand that his glory will be preceded by his suffering. Jesus notes their lack of understanding and predicts the suffering they will endure for the sake of the Gospel. Jesus says that the honor they seek is not his to give. When the other ten hear what James and John have asked, Mark reports that they are indignant. Jesus takes the opportunity to teach them.

Jesus explains the importance of service and sacrifice in the life of a disciple. In particular, he seems to be preparing the Twelve for their leadership roles in the emerging Christian community. Echoing the Gospel we heard several weeks ago (on the <u>25th Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>, Mark 9:33-37), Jesus acknowledges that his teaching is countercultural. In today's Gospel, Jesus contrasts the dynamics within the community of disciples with those shown by the rulers of the Gentiles.

Following Jesus' example of sacrificial love continues to be countercultural in our day as well. We might take this opportunity to consider our models of authority and examine our own exercise of authority. On whose example do we model our leadership?

"Rather whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all. For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for the many... 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.'"

Our society constantly urges us to get ahead. We are not satisfied and want more education, a better job as a mark of success. How different. Remember what Jesus did at the Last Supper. He humbly washed the feet of the apostles as a sign of service and as a lesson for His followers.

The mark of greatness or success is not found in the prestigious role one has, or the power he or she can display. It is found in the service rendered to others as an expression of our love of God.

May we speak as the apostles did, asking Him to assist us in learning how to serve and put it into practice. Think of a person you know who exemplifies this gift.
